The Red Cross has multiple apps for Alerts, Blood Donor, First Aid, Flood, Hurricane, Tornado; be sure to download only those by the <u>American</u> Red Cross unless you're going to other countries.

The following 2 are similar apps for different platforms; more important, they provide quick access to alerts and great hurricane graphics and text but NO local news or emergency info:

Disaster Kit for Pets

Keep an Evac-Sack (or pillow case) and supplies handy for your pets. Make sure that everyone in the family knows where it is. This kit should be clearly labeled and easy to carry. Items to consider keeping in or near your pack include:

	Photocopies of medical records and a waterproof container with a two-week supply of any ne your pet requires (Remember, food and medications need to be rotated out of your emergency otherwise they may go had or become useless)
	otherwise they may go bad or become useless) Pet first-aid kit and guide book (ask your vet what to include, or visit the ASPCA Store to buy one

	3-7 days-worth of canned (pop-top) or dry food (be sure to rotate every two months)
	Disposable litter trays (aluminum roasting pans are perfect)
	Litter or paper toweling
	Liquid dish soap and disinfectant
	Disposable garbage bags for clean-up
	Pet feeding dishes
	Extra collar or harness as well as an extra leash
	Bottled water, at least 7 days' worth for each person and pet (store in a cool, dry place and replace
	two months)
	A traveling bag, crate or sturdy carrier, ideally one for each pet
	Flashlight
	Blanket (for scooping up a fearful pet)
	Recent photos of your pets (in case you are separated and need to make "Lost" posters)
	Especially for cats: Pillowcase or Evac-Sack, toys, scoopable litter
	Especially for dogs: Extra leash, toys and chew toys, a week's worth of cage liner
